## Greenberg hearings end; decision expected by today

The Faculty Appellate Committee was expected to reach a final decision by today on the status of Michael Greenberg in the History Department, based on testimony heard after the third and final hearing held Monday night.

Greenberg's chief witness, David Martin, professor of English, was not permitted to testify because the committee felt his testimony would be irrelevent. Martin, shortly after the Maxwell Taylor incident, submitted a detailed report and recommentation concerning the events of April 22, 1970 to the president of the college.

Greenberg was also not permitted to present his final point: iren the nature of the attrocities of the Vietnam War, his ctions at the Taylor incident would be morally justified.

Greenberg, during the course

of the three hearings, tried to establish several points. One was that although Greenberg admits that his actions were inappropriate, the nature of the war necessitated a protest in some form at the Taylor lecture.

A second point, backed up by witnesses, was that the History-Government Department's decision not to renew Greenberg's contract was the result of administrative pressure on the department.

Another point was that he was not given due process; he originally was not given the opportunity to defend himself.
