Policy questioned, VMC sets plans

The Vietnam Moratorium Committee was hampered this week by the administration of the college in its plans for activities today, as the committee was informed than non-students would not be permitted to participate in any of the scheduled campus events.

According to Reuban Williams, committee spokesman, Joseph A. Yanchik, dean of students, told him that it was the policy of the college that non-students would not be permitted to participate in campus activities. Mr. Williams said that in light of this policy, the administration is asking the public not to come to the campus moratorium activities.

Mr. Williams said that he feels it his duty as a student to become involved with the public. He continued, "I feel that this attitude by the administration is dictatorial and that it is a deliberate attempt to stifle anti-war activities. They allow outsiders to attend lectures, art shows and book fairs, so why not protest?"

The activities scheduled for today begin with a rally at the Student Union at 11:00 a.m. There will be performances by a rock group and several folk singers. The three main speakers will include a member of the Black Panther Party, an SDS member, and a representative of the American Service Union.

The rally will be followed at 12:30 by a march from the Student Union to the main parking lot. The protesters will then reassemble at 2:00 p.m. at the Municipal Building in Eatontown to prepare for a march past the West Gate of Fort Monmouth. Following the march there will be a rally in the park across from the gate of the fort.

At 8:00 p.m. there will be a rally held in the Monmouth College gymnasium. Speakers will include David Bournes, chairman of the Board of Directors of the Committee for Responsibility in Hartford, Connecticut, and Frederik Pohl, a McCarthy delegate at the Democratic National Convention and the editor of Galaxy magazine.

The rally will also include a trilogy of dances performed by Mrs. M. Deakin, entitled, Peace: Maiden; War; Sorrow: A Woman.
