Rallyers point out positive results

Michael Greenberg, assistant professor of History, a scheduled speaker, said "74% of the population wants out of the war now. This was inspired by students. Although Nixon probably will not end the war, students must continue fighting in order to help establish an anti-war administration in 1971."

Another speaker, Arthur Weinberg, instructor in business administration, said "There would be no Vietnamization without the anti-war movement. Nixon would have escallated without student protest.

White closed asking Monmouth students to join with the nationally striking students, but added that he would strike alone, if need be.

A national anti-war strike on May 5 and 6, and a strike against the school on May 7 has been announced by Bob White, president of the S.G.A. who urged Monmouth students to participate.

At a rally in the gym on Wednesday, White told about 500 students "We're frustrated, but we have to go on. This strike will not end the war or repression immediately, but we must keep up the pressure."

White said that he and others are trying to merge the college with local labor and high schools, in hopes of making the strike more effective. He also urged the 500 present to spread the word about the strike.
